DISTRICT RESULTS SUMMARY

1. Introduction

- Each year for the past 20 years, M-DCPS has conducted the School Climate Surveys involving parents, students, and staff.
- The purpose of these surveys is to gather information regarding what these groups think about the school and their perceptions concerning how the school can be improved.
- The surveys do not have any identifying information and therefore all responses received from the three stakeholder groups are anonymous.
- Results have been provided in considerable detail in order to facilitate an in-depth view of the learning climate at each school.

2. Methodology

- Large stratified random samples of parents, and students were selected to participate in the School Climate Surveys.
- All instructional staff at all schools were selected to participate in the School Climate Surveys.
- In 2014-15, school climate surveys were distributed to representative samples of approximately:
 - 99,000 parents
 - 60,000 students
 - 20,000 staff members (instructional staff at each school)
- The parent survey was developed in three languages: English, Spanish, and Creole.
- The staff surveys were administered online through anonymous unique user-id and password.

3. Validity

- The parent and student samples have been representative of the entire M-DCPS parent and student populations with regards to demographic variables, such as ethnicity and grade level. This is mainly due to following elements:
 - Large populations to select from (Over 350,000 students);
 - Random selections; and
 - Large samples (99,000 parents, and 60,000 students)
- All instructional staff at all schools were included in the survey.
- The return rates were high for all three stakeholders:
 - 44,511 out of 97,755 parents responded (Return rate: 45.5%)
 - 43,812 out of 57,511 students responded (Return rate: 76.2%)
 - 14,227 out of 19,275 staff responded (Return rate: 73.8%)

4. What do the Climate Surveys measure?

- The opinions offered in the climate surveys represent anonymous and self- reported perceptions on the part of the stakeholders and may not precisely describe the actual situation at every school.
- However, these opinions represent a reality to the respondents and should afford insight into the impression a school is making on the local community.
- Results by school is especially important given the fact that there is considerable variability among the M-DCPS schools with regard to demographic indicators, such as socio-economics, ethnicity, and geographic location.

5. Overall Comments

The patterns of the responses for all groups were similar to the previous year's patterns, and do not deviate greatly from the response patterns of earlier administrations. All groups were generally positive in their responses, as they have been in previous years, expressing general agreement with the survey items. On average, parents and staff have a high percent of agreement with the items expressing a high degree of satisfaction with their schools. Students at the elementary level also have a high average agreement on these items, but middle and senior high students are less likely to express satisfaction with their school.
